

Talking Heads: SAE J3016

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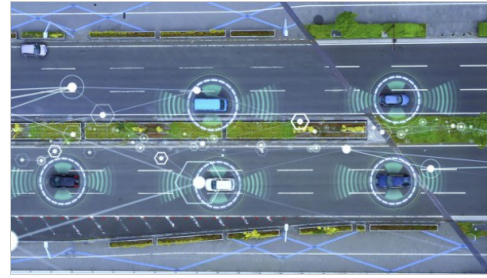

To most, J3016 is better known as the standard for referencing vehicle autonomy levels. It is the source for the six levels of autonomy from L0 through to L5 that have entered the popular discourse since their creation in 2014.
